## Arthur Martin Hall

May 31, 1918 - October 10, 2000

Dr. Arthur M. Hall, a retired family physician at the St. Anthony Falls Clinic in Minneapolis and medical missionary in South Africa, died Oct. 10 of complications from a stroke. He was 82.

For 25 years he listened to patients in "a compassionate, loving way," said his son Rob of Lakeville. "He was a caring friend to many and was never afraid to share his faith in Christ."

After his right leg was amputated in 1990 because of diabetes, Hall continued to practice until he retired in 1991.

He was born in Idaho and grew up in Kenyon, Minn. He received a bachelor's degree from St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn., and a medical degree from the University of Minnesota. After college he interned at the old Lutheran Deaconess Hospital in Minneapolis for about a year before being drafted for World War II, where he served in the Pacific.

After the war he opened a practice in northeast Minneapolis and worked there for three years. In 1951 he went to South Africa as a missionary for the American Lutheran Church, where he worked for 13 years. He helped open the Hlabisa Lutheran Mission Hospital in Hlabisa, Zululand. He also helped teach nurses and Africans how to do administrative hospital work. Today the hospital is known for its care of Africans with AIDs.

His wife, Marge, was a nurse at the hospital and worked alongside him. She died in February.

Joanne Lien of Cedar Falls, Iowa, said her father "enjoyed being a doctor in South Africa more," but returned to the United States in 1966 because of family obligations and went to work for the St. Anthony Falls Clinic.

Rob Hall said his father wanted to be a pastor but didn't like public speaking, so he ended up using his medical skills to help people instead.

"He was a good doctor," his son said. "He's from the old school, very caring."

Hall died at the Cedar Falls Lutheran Home in Iowa. Besides his son daughter, survivors include another daughter, Marcia Dolezal of Stillwater; another son, David of Ventura, Calif.; two sisters Thelma Gilbert of Morris, Minn. and Ruth of Minneapolis; a brother, Enouch of Iowa, and 12 grandchildren.
